Subject: Call for volunteers to join the EHC Mental Health Working Group

Dear EHC National Member Organisations (NMOs),

The European Haemophilia Consortium (EHC) is currently looking for six (6) volunteers to join its Mental Health Working Group for a period of one year (2027).

The Mental Health Working Group will continue the work started during the first two terms (2025-2026). The group will focus on developing and disseminating mental health resources and supporting awareness campaigns and educational content in collaboration with psychosocial care professionals. Where relevant, the group will collaborate with other EHC committees to address the specific mental health needs of distinct communities within the bleeding disorders field, and provide insight and advice to EHC members, volunteers, and staff on mental health-related matters.

The EHC is currently inviting applications for:

- Six (6) volunteers who either have a bleeding disorder or are a relative/caregiver of a person with a bleeding disorder.

The ideal candidate will:

- Be a member of or have a strong professional link with one of the EHC NMOs;
- Be fluent in English;
- Commit to dedicating enough time to fulfil the activities carried out by the working group. The estimated time needed is one hour per week, plus a one-hour online meeting per month. The workload may require the ability to work on short notice and to meet tight deadlines;
- Have experience at either national or international level in carrying out mental health activities in the bleeding disorder community.

To apply for this position, candidates will need to send:

- The candidate's CV, outlining in particular relevant experience such as volunteering;
- A motivation letter outlining their background briefly and why they are interested in joining the working group;
- A letter of recommendation from the NMO President outlining why they believe the candidate would make a great addition to the Mental Health Working Group;

- The [Code of Conduct Form](#) duly completed and signed.

EHC MENTAL HEALTH WORKING GROUP

About mental health in the bleeding disorders community

When we speak about mental health in the bleeding disorders community, we refer to the overall emotional and psychological well-being of people living with bleeding disorders. The Mental Health Working Group was created in early 2025 to develop a mental health survey conducted by the European Haemophilia Consortium (EHC), present its results, and propose new initiatives based on the findings. This group brings together individuals committed to promoting mental health awareness and support within the community.

Role

The Mental Health Working Group supports the EHC's work on mental health and psychosocial well-being within the bleeding disorders community across Europe. The group contributes to the development and dissemination of mental health resources and supports awareness campaigns and educational content in collaboration with psychosocial care professionals. Where relevant, the group seeks to collaborate with other EHC committees to address the specific mental health needs of distinct communities within the bleeding disorders field, and provides insight and advice to EHC members, volunteers, and staff on mental health-related matters.

Composition

The EHC Mental Health Working Group shall be composed of no more than 8 persons:

Volunteers:

- One healthcare professional, e.g., nurse or haematologist;
- 5-6 volunteers who either have a bleeding disorder or are a relative/caregiver of a person with a bleeding disorder. In the selection of volunteers, different bleeding disorders, involvement in EHC National Member Organisations (NMOs), experience, and geographical spread will be taken into consideration.

EHC structures:

- One EHC Steering Committee member;
- One EHC staff member.

To a large extent, the Working Group will seek expertise from the EHC Medical

Advisory Group (MAG). When needed, the Working Group may consult additional external experts on particular issues.

Eligibility

The members shall:

- Be members of or have a strong professional link with one of the EHC NMOs;
- Be fluent in English;
- Commit to dedicating enough time to fulfil the activities carried out by the Mental Health Working Group. The estimated time needed is one hour per week, plus a one-hour online meeting per month. The workload may require the ability to work on short notice and to meet tight deadlines;
- Have experience at either the national or international level in carrying out mental health activities in the bleeding disorder community.

Selection process and mandate

The above members of the Mental Health Working Group shall be selected as follows:

- An open call for volunteers will be sent out to EHC NMOs; the volunteers shall be selected on the basis of meeting the above criteria and on the quality of their applications. Selected candidates will be appointed by the EHC Steering Committee for a period of one year,
- The EHC Steering Committee member shall be appointed by the EHC Steering Committee for a period of one year,
- The EHC staff member shall be appointed by the EHC Chief Executive Officer for a period of one year.

The Working Group shall appoint a chair with a mandate of one year, who will be responsible for leading the work of the Working Group. The chair shall meet with the EHC Steering Committee to report on the group's activities.

If any member of the Working Group should resign during his/her mandate, the EHC will open a new call for applications to find a replacement.

If any member of the Mental Health Working Group does not attend three consecutive meetings without prior notice and a reasonable explanation, the Working Group shall have the discretion to remove his/her membership.

The Steering Committee liaison is a full member of the Working Group with rights and duties.

Working Group members agree to allow personal information to be used as per the EHC Privacy and Data Handling Policy.

Working Group members agree to undertake their responsibilities as members of the Mental Health Working Group in line with the EHC Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest.
